Getting Ready for Lent

Lent is a season of 40 days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 18) and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word lencten, which means "spring." The 40 days represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry. Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter and is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the 40 days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

AUMC's Lenten Study 2015: THE LIFE YOU'VE ALWAYS WANTED Spiritual Disciplines for Ordinary People, Feb 15 - Apr. 5

What does true spiritual life really look like? What keeps you from living such a life? What can you do to pursue it? AUMC's eighth annual church-wide Lenten Study is The Life You've Always Wanted: Spiritual Disciplines for Ordinary People by John Ortberg. The heart of Christianity is transformation—a relationship with God that impacts not just our "spiritual lives," but every aspect of living. John Ortberg (author of If You Want to Walk on Water, You've Got to Get Out of the Boat) offers modern perspectives on the ancient path of the spiritual disciplines. But this is more than just a book about things to do to be a good Christian. It's a road map toward true transformation that starts not with the individual but with the object of the journey—Jesus Christ. (Cont. on pg. 4.)

Shrove Tuesday is Feb 17. Also known as Pancake Tuesday, Pancake Day, Mardi Gras, and Fat Tuesday, Shrove Tuesday is the day preceding Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Everyone is invited to AUMC's Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on Feb. 17, 5:45 - 6:30 p.m. in Wright Hall. The evening will feature family activities, crafts, pancake races and a kids' parade. Children are invited to come in costume. The supper is sponsored by Children's Ministry and United Methodist Men and the meal price (pay at the door) is \$8 per person, \$3 for children under 9, and \$25 per family maximum. Pancakes are associated with the day preceding Lent because they use up rich foods such as eggs, milk and sugar before the fasting seasons of Lent.

Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The worship service focuses on both themes, helping us to realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. During Ash Wednesday services, the minister will lightly rub the sign of the cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers. The ash cross on the forehead is an outward sign of our sorrow and repentance for sins. AUMC's Ash Wednesday worship service will be held on Feb. 18, 7:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

CLERGY CORNER



SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES

Grace and peace in the name of our Savior!

"Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice", says the Apostle Paul (Philippians 4:4).

Rejoice! That may seem like an off kilter sentiment for a column written on the eve of our Lenten observation. Lent brings to mind somber hues, darkened sanctuaries, silent reflections, repentant hearts, the sorrow of Calvary's crucifixion. And yet...

Before I go on, the centering activity of our Lenten observation is focusing on our spiritual disciplines; to introspectively examine our lives to see where they are continuous or discontinuous with God's intention, then to engage appropriate disciplines to help bring our lives into accord with the divine intention. As the author of our study this season offers, this exercise in spiritual growth sometimes leaves us feeling intimidated, daunted, and awash in feelings of inadequacy (John Ortberg, The Life You've Always Wanted: Spiritual Disciplines for Ordinary People). This inhibits the process and, in some cases, causes the devotee to give up altogether. As Ortberg describes it, "I tried this strategy for a few weeks, but I soon felt overwhelmed and exhausted by it." (p. 45). It certainly does not evoke feelings of joy.

But he goes on to say that the most accurate indicator of our spirituality is our ability to love God and love others. And the process of spiritual development is training ourselves so as to be better able to love God and love others. Sometimes this takes the form of the classic disciplines – scripture study, prayer, meditation – and all are worthy paths to loving God and neighbor. But they also take the form of freedom, for the love of God has set us free to pursue lives of joy. The aim of all disciplines is for us to develop a deeper relationship with God. This delights God, who is the source of all joy. We all have work that we must do to remove the impediments to this journey, and augment that which is already moving in that direction. This is what Ortberg characterizes as training. And so...

Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice.

Rejoice because it need not be an arduous, tedious, wearisome endeavor. It can be – I would suggest it must be – an exercise of love. I invite you to join us in this liberating study. Oh, I would also recommend to you the remainder of what Paul had to say in that passage: "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." May you rejoice in your learnings during this season.
